Azulejo Tiles

Portugal's famous blue-and-white glazed tiles have a long and storied past. When Moors invaded the country in the eighth century, they brought azulejos — ceramic tiles whose Arabic name means “small polished stones.” Tiles such as these may date as far back as Mesopotamia (civilization there flourished between 4500 B.C. and A.D. 539), where they were used to protect the exteriors of buildings.

Azulejos were originally painted a variety of colors — blue, green, gold and even reddish-brown. However, the love of Chinese blue-and-white porcelain, which had so gripped the Dutch and Flemish cultures in the 16th century, took hold of the Iberians as well, and the Portuguese became besotted with blue and white.

The tiles blossomed in popularity and — especially between the 17th and 18th centuries — became Portugal's predominant decorative art form. They can be found adorning palaces, churches, public buildings, staircases, walls and train stations. Their designs portray cultural, religious and historical scenes, mythological tales and stories from literature. They served as a way to educate and enlighten, since books were expensive and not always accessible to average citizens.



The Douro River valley is famous for producing many varieties of wine and, more famously, for the distinctive fortified wine called port, which cannot be produced anywhere else in the world. This region's unique topography and geography, and the number of microclimates along the twisting Douro River, are responsible for the diverse variety of delicious grapes that can grow here...and, consequently, the number of different wines that can be produced.

Port, a local specialty loved the world over, is made of a blend of up to 40 kinds of grapes. The grapes are picked by hand (machines can't harvest as well as humans) and are usually crushed by foot (machines tend to break the seeds, releasing too much tannin and a bitter flavor). The stomping takes place in granite vats called lagares, which then drain into fermentation tanks made of cement or steel. However, the fermentation process is halted before completion by the addition of brandy (usually imported from South Africa). This stabilizes the port for long-term aging and creates a distinctive dry sweetness that people keep coming back for.

Day 1 | November 6

Depart your home city.

Madrid, Spain

Day 2 | November 7

Arrive in Madrid, Spain. Transfer to the deluxe, historic **Wellington Hotel & Spa**. Settle in and spend the afternoon exploring at your leisure, and make your own plans for lunch and dinner.

Madrid/Salamanca/ Barca d'Alva, Portugal/ Embark River Boat

Day 3 | November 8

On a scenic drive to Salamanca, pass charming villages, olive groves and farms. What began as a prehistoric community evolved into an ancient Roman settlement and university town (the world-famous university was founded in 1218). Called Spain's "Golden City," Salamanca boasts historic buildings in a mix of architectural styles, many made of gold-colored sandstone. Enjoy a traditional Spanish

lunch at a local restaurant, then embark on a city tour. Transfer to Barca d'Alva and embark the deluxe **AmaVida**. This evening, join your fellow passengers for the Captain's Welcome Reception and Dinner. (B,L,R,D)

Barca d'Alva

Day 4 | November 9

Join a walking tour through the medieval streets of Castelo Rodrigo, a tiny, fortified village built in 1296. From the castle itself, enjoy spectacular views of the valley and the red-roofed stone houses of the village. Enjoy a tasting of local favorites, such as almonds, cheese, bread and wine. The river boat travels from Barca d'Alva to Pinhão this afternoon. Spend time on deck watching the beautiful green and gold hills, terraced vineyards and tiny villages glide past. (B,L,D)

Pinhão

Day 5 | November 10

Stroll to the charming Pinhão Railway Station, famous for

its lovely azulejos — distinctive blue-and-white, hand-painted tiles. The azulejos depict scenes of local significance — quintas (vineyards), winemakers, folk culture and local landscapes. Next, enjoy an authentic, delectable dining experience complete with traditional Portuguese music at a family-run quinta. Explore the quinta's museum, which showcases the fascinating history and culture of wine in the Alto Douro region — complete with tastings. (B,L,D)

Régua

Day 6 | November 11

Explore Mateus Palace and Gardens on a guided tour. The Baroque façade is well known, as it is pictured on the Mateus rosé wine label. The palace is brimming with antiques and artwork; the gardens boast formal beds, topiaries and statues; the captivating Cedar Tunnel is an aromatic

and memorable highlight. After lunch, visit the ancient and picturesque town of Lamego, which produces wines, fruit and smoked meats. Stroll the cobblestoned streets and the town's wide boulevard, lined with cafes and market stalls. Lamego is home to one of the most important pilgrimage sites in Portugal, the Nossa Senhora dos Remédios, set on a spectacular hilltop. The church is accessed by a Baroque double staircase of 686 steps and nine terraces, decorated with statues, azulejos and urns. The views at the top are spectacular! End the day with a tasting of local specialties and wines. (B,L,D)

Entre-Os-Rios

Day 7 | November 12

Spend the morning on deck watching the beautiful scenery gliding by, or enjoying the ship's amenities. Dock in Entre-Os-Rios and lunch at a local quinta. Spend the

afternoon exploring the town, ideally located between two rivers. Take in the rolling landscapes and beautiful views; meander the cobble streets, admiring historic churches and architecture. (B,L,D)

Porto

Day 8 | November 13

Join a guided tour of Porto's historic quarter, a UNESCO World Heritage site. See the Porto Cathedral, one of the city's oldest monuments, and Liberty Square, the town's main plaza, ringed with shops and cafés, connecting the historic and modern parts of the city. Don't miss the São Bento Railway Station, one of the most beautiful train stations in Europe. Admire the 22,000 incredible azulejos. This afternoon, indulge in a final Douro Valley port tasting. You will have a choice on how you arrive — by motorcoach or via a scenic hike. (B,L,D)

Porto

Day 9 | November 14

Enjoy some free time today to stroll the cobble lanes of Porto's UNESCO-designated Ribeira (Riverside) district, with its narrow streets winding past shops and cafés. Stop in at the 14th-century Church of São Francisco. Marvel at the grand 19th-century Palácio da Bolsa, formerly a stock market, built to impress potential investors. And of course there are plenty of shops and markets to search for that perfect souvenir. This evening, join your fellow passengers for a Farewell Reception and Dinner. (B,L,R,D)

Porto/Disembark/ Return to Home City

Day 10 | November 15

Following breakfast, disembark and transfer to the airport for your return flight home. (B)
